Please check their website or call 863-687-8475 for more details about the food pantry. We have boxes in the mail room at the back of the church. We collect gently used clothing for men or women-making sure it is clean, zippers work, buttons on, and no stains. PLEASE DO NOT PUT YOUR SEPTEMBER UNDERWEAR DONA-TIONS IN THIS BOX. THEY GO IN THE **ENTRYWAY BOX.** We also collect canned food-soups, veggies, fruit, meat, non-perishables - pasta, cereal, etc.. Always greatly needed are shampoo, creme conditioner, bars of soap, paper goods-napkins, plates, toilet paper, tissues, etc. SNAP (food stamps) doesn't allow personal care items like shampoo, etc. OR cleaning supplies. Our donations are picked up on the second Tuesday of every month, so we prefer that you bring them as close to that date as possible, but anytime you come, they are welcome.

Faith and Good Works

What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. (James 2:14-17 ESV)

Robert Benne is his book *Reasonable Ethics* notes, ... Often people do not live wholly Christian lives. Their Christian convictions only apply to small areas of their lives. Their god is a 'god of the gaps.' God fills in the meanings for those parts of life that are not accounted for by economics, psychology, and sociology—or Ann Landers.... The most impressive churches I know recognize how people have been affected, and they are busily constructing a counterattack. They know that Christians have to be whole people, living out a comprehensive vision of life that gives meaning and guidance to all they do. (St. Louis: Concordia, 2005).

In James's epistle we see a description of how the Christian who has been justified by Christ is to live. A deep and abiding faith given in the waters of baptism will necessarily shape how one lives life. True Christian faith will show itself with the fruit of good works. As we rest in God's Word, we can rest assured that He will use us to be an influence for good to those around us. We are redeemed to make a difference. Faith necessarily leads to good works. The Christian life is not a passive one; we are on the go. We feed the hungry and clothe the naked. It's just what those in Christ do, for it is what Jesus did and continues to do through us. Christ gives us a comprehensive vision for our lives in calling us to loving service to others in our various vocations. Resting in God's Word and your baptismal grace, we are empowered to leave the world better than we found it. Christ is at work in you!

Christ Lutheran Church Council Meeting in a Nutshell By Pam West, Council Secretary August 9th,2021



A synopsis of the committees efforts of the CLC Council for congregational information.

President: John Freer: (John e-mailed his report while on vacation (3))

When he returns he will be finalizing a new contract for purchase and maintenance contract of a new copier. This will save us \$2,000-\$3,000 per year. We will be starting a new painting project in the kitchen and have repaired a roof leak. John has also negotiated with a security company for monitoring the security cameras that have been installed and finished upon his return. Termite inspections have been competed in the Classrooms and Sanctuary areas and no active termites were found. There will be discussions held and decisions to be made on the last of the audio visual equipment purchases needed. We have been borrowing the items so we could get up and running. We will keep you all aware of the details on these items.

Vice President: Don Racer:

We had two presentations at the meeting; 1- Kim Kaniecki presented a proposal for a mobile bulletin board to display "Needs and Seeds". If a congregational member has a "need" like a window leak and one of our parishioners can fix it they get in touch with them to assist and do the repair . 2- John Sawyer explained the remaining equipment we have been using from him and why we need to purchase specific items to maintain our live streaming.

Don also revised the abuse policy to incorporate language to clarify adult supervision requirements under Section "two adults rule". The revision is posted on the bulletin board in the fellowship Hall. The Ad Hoc Committee has completed all preparations for the congregational meeting on August 15th. Copies of the amendments were placed in mailboxes on July 25th. Notice of the meeting posted on bulletin boards July 25th and also in the bulletin three consecutive weeks beginning July 25th. Pastor announced the meeting date before all worship services. Final notice of meeting was in Saturday and Sunday bulletins August 14 & 15th.

<u>Treasurer: Jon Lindstrom:</u>

Actual July income was \$17,273 which brings YTD income to \$154,452. Actual July expenses were \$26,324 which brings YTD expenses to \$177,733. Our total Mid-Florida Balances are \$363,509, Dedicated is \$202,599 and undedicated totals \$160,910. Stewardship reports that church income is 3% lower this year than last year. We will be starting budget prep in September and Council Position nominations, for the upcoming November elections, in October. If you are interested in serving on the nomination committee please inform John Freer.

Financial Secretary: Diane Bickart:

Income this year ending in July is \$153,058.87 compared to \$160,218.34 last year, The month of July was \$18,860.95 this year and \$14,839.60 last year. Offerings this year were \$4,021 more than last year. This makes 4 months in a row that contributions were more than the same month last year. We have spent more than we have received but fortunately we have an undedicated excess to help cover these expenses. We will really have to be careful planning our budget for next year because at the current time we have no idea how long this round of Covid infections will last or how it will affect our church income.

I am grateful to all those who organized and helped with VBS. I am covering some of Terry's office duties as she was exposed to Covid - 19. She is preparing the bulletins from home.

Our new Bible Study is: "God the Creator Study Guide: Our Beginning, Our Rebellion, and Our Way Back" by Randy Frazee.

Elders are reviewing our mask wearing policy monthly along with the CDC Guidelines. We are asking all unvaccinated persons to wear a mask while on church premises.

I will be inviting people to participate in Lutheran Hour Ministries' Hopeful Neighborhood Initiative.

I met with the organ repair personnel and fully support the purchase of a new or used organ; Ours cannot be repaired.

I would like to suggest to Council that an ORGAN ad-hoc Committee be established. Our current organ is unrepairable due to its age and we can look at a good used one as well as a new organ. Caleb Wehling's letter:

Members of Christ Lutheran Church,

First, I want to thank you all again for your support of us during our time at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis! Over and over again I am amazed at the generosity with which God has blessed us through people and churches like you. It is truly humbling and encouraging to see this outpouring of God and the Church.

I know not everyone saw my initial letter I sent introducing myself and my wife Alicia, so I wanted to provide a quick re-introduction about us here, as well as let you all know about the rest of our summer and the upcoming semester.

I grew up in Liberal, Kansas, and my wife Alicia grew up in Nebraska; we both went to Concordia University, Nebraska in 2013 and graduated in 2017. She graduated with teaching and English degrees, and is currently teaching 6th grade English and religion and 2-4th grade P.E. at Immanuel Lutheran in St. Charles, MO. I graduated with a degree in biology and chemistry, and then got a master's degree in biology from the University of Nebraska (originally I planned to be a biology professor).

Funnily enough, though we were friends throughout college we didn't start dating until after we graduated. In fact, I asked her on a date 3 days before she moved away to her first teaching call to Faith Lutheran in Las Vegas – just in time! So for a year and a half we dated long-distance, flying to see each other whenever we could, until I proposed in October 2018.

We were married in July in 2019, and lived in Lincoln, Nebraska for a year so that I could finish my master's degree. We began seminary a little over a year ago.

In the spring semester of last year, I completed my first homiletics class, which means that I am officially certified to preach sermons! So only a few weekends ago I led services and preached for the first time at a dual parish in two small towns out in Illinois. They both went well, and the members of the church were incredibly kind and supportive to us, which was so reassuring because I was so nervous! Public speaking was one of my fears coming into the seminary; I get very nervous when I'm up in front of everyone, and it's taken a lot of work to tackle that fear. But it's been so rewarding to see that God can use even me, someone scared to speak, to speak His Word to His people.

In a few weeks I will begin my 2nd year at the seminary. The 2nd year is supposed to be a particularly difficult year in the program. We continue to take classes studying the Bible using Greek and Hebrew, and also on complicated systematic theology. We also take classes on worship and teaching the faith. And besides all of that, as part of the program I will be helping out a few times a week at a local Lutheran Senior Services hospice care facility, as well as helping with services at the church where Alicia teaches. I've realized after a year at the seminary that managing time and the various tasks of the program is at least as important as doing any particular thing well.

Our lives at the seminary can often feel a bit frantic and tiring. As I mentioned above, the program keeps me plenty busy! And Alicia, as a teacher, is, of course, even busier! She's looking forward to being at the same school this year and teaching the same subjects. But it's still a lot of work to be teaching in a school and grade level which are relatively new for her. We also look forward to settling down somewhere when I get my first call, instead of living temporarily in multiple places.

Despite all of that, being at the seminary is a tremendous blessing. The community of future pastors and pastors' wives is an incredible gift. Plus, we enjoy living in St. Louis, going to Cardinals baseball games, walking in Forest Park near the seminary, and getting Ted Drewes' frozen custard! We are truly blessed by God and thankful for all He's given us.
