

DON'T FORGET BAGS FOR TALBOT HOUSE —



Thank you to all of you who continue to support this ministry! Talbot House does extraordinary things to help the homeless. We are blessed to share in that ministry! Their doors are open to both men and women and they provide meals, shelter, & clothing, and direct them to medical care as needed. We collect offerings of canned goods-meat, vegetables, fruit, soup, paper goods-paper towels, toilet paper, napkins; cleaning supplies; soap-dishwashing, personal soap, laundry; toothbrushes & toothpaste. We also collect gently used clothes -free from stains, and have working zippers and buttons. There are especially marked baskets in the mail room at the back of the church to place your offerings. Our pickup day is the second Tuesday of every month. We also have a box on top of the table where you may place unused medicines, empty pill bottles, and unopened bottles of over the counter medicines. Talbot House uses the empty pill bottles to measure out soap and shampoo for the residents. Please remove labels from the empty bottles. Large containers of spices, flour, and sugar are real blessings.



From the Pastor.....



Time and tide wait for no man.

We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming, when no one can work. (John 9:4, ESV)

On May 18 th the Mexican Navy training ship Cuauhtémoc hit the Brooklyn Bridge, tragically killing two cadets and wounding many others. As I followed the news coverage (I find the age of sail fascinating), I was reminded of the saying, “Time and tide wait for no man.” While modern sailing ships have motors to be used for propulsion to aid navigation, the tall ships of a different era did not. The ships masters would consult the tide charts and the weather patterns to see when it was safe to embark from port. The result is that multiple ships would often try to embark as soon as the hide tide shifted to an ebb tide. If one was still ashore, then one was left behind. The water levels would still be high, while the ship would be aided by the downstream, outbound current. The Cuauhtémoc departed during flood tide, requiring the vessel to navigate against the current while leaving port. This circumstance unfortunately eliminated a critical safeguard in the event of a mechanical malfunction.

Time and tide wait for no man. All to often as Christians we get stuck in a rut. We behave exactly as we always did without noticing that the tide has shifted. In previous congregations, we held onto print newspaper advertising perhaps longer than was appropriate as people stopped reading the newspaper. In New England, churches were one of the few public places that did not have air conditioning, leading to discomfort for those habituated to constant coolness; some did not worship in the heat of the summer. In the essential ways of sticking to doctrine derived from God’s Work, we will always be unapologetically counter-cultural, swimming against the currents of the world around us. There are some things that will always be right and always be wrong. There are traditions of the church that will not be abandoned to cater to the whims of a fickle culture. That said, we have the flexibility to not go against the current when we don’t have to. We don’t need to put up unnecessary boundaries to spiritual seekers in areas where Scripture is silent. We can “go with the flow” in ways that are consonant with Scripture is we join Jesus in His mission to seek and save the lost. The same Jesus who defied



the currents of the Jewish and Roman cultures of His day by eating with tax collectors and sinners and ultimately paying the price of death. May we remain faithful in the essentials, and flexible in the non-essentials for the sake of those who need to be introduced to Jesus.

Bible Study



In *A Man Named Martin - Part 1: The Man* viewers encounter a 15th-century religious reformer from Germany who broke ranks with the Catholic Church. This Bible study is the first of a three-part series devoted to Martin Luther -- a monk whose Spirit-inspired grasp of God's justification of sinners through faith in the Savior was the cornerstone of the Protestant Reformation.

In this five-session Bible study, Luther's life and times are examined through the lens of history, religion and theology. Expanding on commentary from Rev. Gregory Seltz, former Speaker for The Lutheran Hour, numerous scholars add their expertise and perspective to render an illuminating portrait of the life of this extraordinary human being.

The influence and impact of Luther's life is the stuff of serious study. As a forlorn sinner feeling lost and desperate before a stern and exacting Judge, Luther desponded of all hope for eternity. But as one who came to cling to the Spirit-delivered truths of justification by faith and the liberty believers experience by God's grace, he rebounded to become a triumphant ambassador for the Gospel.

A Word from the President

Preparation is key. I'm sure most people would agree with that. When someone such as a mechanic has a job to do, they would have to have all the tools at hand that they would need, in their toolbox, otherwise their job would be quite ineffective.

A pastor would seldom step up to a pulpit and just "wing it". There would be hours spent preparing for the words he plans to give at the next worship service. He would likely research facts, look up references and pray for spiritual guidance. Only then could he rest assured that what he says would be effective and worthwhile.

I have spoken many times on the church being a 'body' with many parts. In order for these parts to be effective, we must prepare them. One of the roles in the church that many, if not all, are capable of performing is prayer. But for our prayers to be effective, we must be prepared even for that. Much of that preparation is simply understanding how effective prayer is accomplished.

First, we must pray in accordance with God's will. When God's will is unknown, we should ask God to reveal that to us. Staying in the Word also helps us to know His will.

Second, we must pray with faith. The woman that touched the hem of Jesus *knew* that she would be healed if she simply touched his garment. That kind of faith can move mountains.

Thirdly, obedience is key. Things what would displease our Lord can be a hindrance in our prayer life.

Other important things include forgiveness of sins and others, humility, and earnestness. These are all valuable qualities of an effective prayer life.

There are many things in our personal lives and in the life of the church that require an effective prayer. Our church is in need of elders and other roles of service. The leaders of the church are asking that each of you as members of this church pray earnestly for the Lord to help us fill these roles. If you are unable to fulfill any of these needs, please

Christian Education

After I wrote my article on watching Worship Anew, I forgot to mention that one of our older members, Fran Klug watches Worship Anew faithfully on Sunday. I don't know if anyone else watches this worship service but I'm sure you have been blessed with the messages from the six pastors who lead these worship services.

Please keep in your prayers the people of Our Savior, Zephyrhills. Yesterday they found out their call for a new pastor was declined. They will be extending a new call to a pastor from Kentucky. Pastor Steinke, their formal interim pastor, is doing better. He and his wife attended the service yesterday but he is still weak and he is using a cane. Keep Pastor and Mrs. Steinke in your prayers too.

Growing up, the hymnbook we used was The Lutheran Hymnal. For many years this was the hymnbook of our Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. Then if you remember came the "blue" hymnbook and now we have the Lutheran Service Book. Even though our services are now in the bulletin we still have the Lutheran Service Book in our pews. I hope once in a while you take the opportunity and go through this hymnbook.

When you open the cover you will see Prayers for Worship. I especially use the ones before and after communion. When you get to Roman numeral X you will see the breakdown of the Church Year followed by the Feasts and Festivals. On XII you will see the section on Commemorations. As you go through each month how many of the men and women do you recognize and how many do you not recognize. Why not take the opportunity and look up the ones you do not know and see how much information you can gather about each one of them.

The next part is the section of the Lectionaries. If you want to know what lessons we read each Sunday this is the place to look. Years ago we had only the One-Year Lectionary, now we have three. This year we are in Series C.

On page XXIII you will see the dates of Easter and an explanation of why Easter is different every year. For 2026 Easter will be on April 5; for 2027 it will be March 28.

If you are not sure of the meanings of some of the parts of the service please review the Glossary on XXIV and XXV. For example, the Paschal Candle is a large candle used during Eastertide and at baptisms and funerals to signify the presence of the risen Christ among His people. Where is the Paschal Candle in our church?

Next comes the singing of the Psalms. Not all the Psalms are in this section but as you can see many are. Do you have a favorite psalm? Psalm 23? Psalm 27? How about Psalm 51? Take time before the service and read one of the Psalms in your preparation for worship.

Next comes the different worship services we use during the church year. Do you have a favorite one? I especially like the services that have "This is the Feast." By the way Divine Service, Setting Three is pages 5 and 15 of the old Lutheran Hymnal.


Charlotte's Walk!
